- Unit 1 Physical Geography (40% of the AS and 16% of A-Level)
 - Fluvial Environments.
 - Global Biomes and Ecosystems.
 - Weather and Climate.
- Unit 2 Human Geography (40% of the AS and 16% of A-Level)
 - Population Change and Management.
 - Settlement Rural and Urban Issues.
 - Development and Reducing the Development Gap.
- Unit 3 Geographical Skills (20% AS and 16% of A-Level)
 - Geographical Enquiry skills fieldwork, planning, health and safety, data collection, analysis, interpretation and drawing of conclusions. Much of this work relates to the fieldwork at Magilligan.

A2 Geography (60% of the A-Level)


- Unit 1 Physical Geography (40% of A2 and 24% of A-Level).
 - Dynamic Coastal Environments.
 - Plate Tectonics Theory and Outcomes.
- Unit 2 Human Geography (40% of A2 24% of A-Level).
 - Planning for Sustainable Settlements.
 - Tourism.
- Unit 3 Decision Making Exercise (20% of A2 and 12% of the A-Level).
 - In this unit, students develop decision-making skills in a real world scenario. They identify and analyse appropriate material, examine conflicting values and make and justify recommendations.

AS Geographers go to Magilligan.

In November 2021 Year 13 Geographers will carry out field work based at Magilligan Field Centre. We stay 2 nights and complete 3 fieldwork investigations, one of which is prepared for examination in Module 3. This is very like Module 3 at GCSE. This is a compulsory visit and carries a parental contribution of approximately £70.

Use the Resource **together with** your own case study of a city to evaluate restrictions on car usage as an urban traffic management strategy. [18]



- Think creatively and independently


